The UCAS *Application* Step by Step

From first registration to firm acceptance — every stage of the UK university application, explained clearly for students and parents alike.

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Before You *Begin*

UCAS is not complicated — but it is unforgiving of avoidable mistakes. The students who struggle are rarely the least able. They are the ones who misread a deadline or submitted a first draft.

This guide walks through the entire UCAS process in the order you will actually encounter it. Read it once now to see the whole map, then return to each section as you reach it.

THE GOLDEN RULE

Start earlier than you think you need to. Every stage of this process takes longer than expected, and the best applications are the ones that were never rushed. Begin your personal statement in the summer before Year 13 — not in October.

What UCAS Actually Is

UCAS (the Universities and Colleges Admissions Service) is the single, centralised system through which nearly all UK undergraduate applications are made. You submit **one application**, containing **up to five course choices**, and **one personal statement** that must work for all of them.

That last point matters enormously: because you write only one statement, your five choices should be broadly related. Applying to wildly different subjects forces a compromised statement that serves none of them well.

ELEMENT	DETAIL
Course choices	Up to 5 (only 4 for Medicine/Dentistry/Vet)
Personal statement	One, up to 4,000 characters
Reference	One, from a teacher or referee
Predicted grades	Supplied by your school

The *Timeline*

Miss a deadline and you wait a full year. Print this page and keep it somewhere visible.

SUMMER Y12

Research & draft

Explore courses and universities. Begin the first draft of your personal statement. Attend open days.

SEPTEMBER Y13

Register & build

Register on UCAS Hub. Finalise your five choices. Refine the statement with feedback.

MID-OCTOBER

Early deadline

15 October: Oxford, Cambridge, and all Medicine, Dentistry & Veterinary courses. Missing this means waiting a year.

END JANUARY

Main deadline

The equal-consideration deadline for most courses. Submit several weeks early — never on the day.

FEB–MAY

Offers arrive

Universities respond. Compare offers carefully before committing to anything.

MAY

Firm & Insurance

Choose your Firm (first choice) and Insurance (backup with a lower offer).

AUGUST

Results day

Confirm your place, or enter Clearing / Adjustment if needed.

A Note for Parents

Your most valuable contribution is deadline vigilance and calm. Keep this timeline on the fridge. Ask "where are we against this?" rather than "have you done it yet?" — it is less pressuring and more useful.

Step One: *Choosing Courses*

Your five choices are a portfolio, not five separate bets. Structure them deliberately.

1

One or two "aspirational" choices

Courses where the entry requirements are at or slightly above your predicted grades. Aim high — you may exceed expectations.

2

Two or three "realistic" choices

Courses that match your predicted grades well. This is the heart of your application.

3

One "safety" choice

A course with requirements comfortably below your predictions — genuine insurance if results disappoint.

How to Actually Compare Courses

The same degree title can mean very different things at different universities. Look beyond the name:

- **Module content** — read the actual modules, year by year
- **Assessment style** — exams vs coursework vs practicals
- **Entry requirements** — grades and specific subjects
- **Placement / year abroad** options
- **Graduate outcomes** for that specific course

INSIDER TIP

Entry requirements are a floor, not a promise. Meeting them makes you eligible — it does not guarantee an offer at competitive courses. Aim to exceed, not just meet.

Step Two: The *Personal Statement*

The one part of the application you fully control — and the one most often wasted. A strong statement is built, not written in an evening.

The Structure That Works

1

Opening (2–3 sentences)

Never "From a young age I have always been passionate..." Start with something specific — a moment, a question, a discovery.

2

Why this subject (25–30%)

Specific intellectual engagement, not generic enthusiasm. Reference topics, books, ideas you have pursued beyond the syllabus.

3

Super-curricular evidence (30–40%)

What you have *done*: reading, projects, work experience, competitions — each linked to what it taught you.

4

Skills & closing (remainder)

Relevant strengths, then a forward-looking close: what you intend to do with the degree.

THE TEST THAT SEPARATES STRONG FROM WEAK

"I did work experience at a hospital" says nothing. "My work experience showed me how quickly clinical decisions must reconcile incomplete information with patient safety" shows genuine insight. **Show, don't tell — on every single line.**

Steps Three & Four: *Offers & Decisions*

Once submitted, the waiting begins — then the decisions.

Understanding Offers

A **conditional offer** requires you to achieve specified grades. An **unconditional offer** guarantees your place regardless. Never treat a conditional offer as secure — work until results day as if everything depends on it, because it does.

Firm & Insurance

Your **Firm** choice is where you most want to go. Your **Insurance** is your safety net — and it must have a *lower* grade requirement than your Firm, or it serves no purpose.

CHOICE	WHAT IT MEANS	STRATEGY
Firm	Your first choice	Your genuine top pick
Insurance	Your backup	Lower requirement than Firm
Decline	Offers you release	Everything else

COMMON COSTLY ERROR

Choosing an Insurance with the *same* grade requirement as your Firm. If you miss your Firm, you will likely miss your Insurance too — leaving you in Clearing unnecessarily. Always make Insurance genuinely safer.

A Final *Checklist*

Before you hit submit, confirm every one of these.

- ☐ All five choices researched at module level, not just by title
- ☐ Choices structured: aspirational, realistic, and safety
- ☐ Personal statement under 4,000 characters (including spaces)
- ☐ Statement opens with something specific — not a cliché
- ☐ Every activity linked to insight, not just listed
- ☐ Statement works for all five choices
- ☐ Spelling and grammar checked by at least two people
- ☐ Reference confirmed with your referee
- ☐ Predicted grades checked and correct
- ☐ Submitted at least two weeks before the deadline

FOR STUDENTS

This is your future, in your words. Give it the weeks it deserves. Every draft is better than the last.

FOR PARENTS

Proofread, encourage, and watch the deadlines — but let the statement stay in your child's voice. Admissions tutors can tell when a parent wrote it.
